Democrats Pay Coolidge Tribute

The Democratic national convention paused in their work Tuesday, to pay respect to President and Mrs. Coolidge in their hour of sorrow.

When the session began, Rabbi Stephen Wise of New York offered the following resolution on behalf of Franklin D. Roosevelt, chairman of the New York delegation:

"This convention of the Democratic party pauses, this morning under the shadow of the grief that has come to the home of the Chief Executive of our nation together with all our fellow Americans. We bow our heads in sympathy and reverence by the side of our President as he and his family pass thru the valley of the shadow of death.

"We pray that divine comfort and healing may be vouchsafed to the sorrowing parents. May the father and mother of the lovable youth who has been called from life to death find solace and strength in the thought of the loving sympathy of all the American people.

"In token thereof this convention silently bows its head with loyal and affectionate regard for the President and mother of Calvin Coolidge, Jr."

The resolution was adopted by a rising vote and a copy sent to the President.

Punch and Judy in China.
The origin of the Punch and Judy comic puppet show has been the subject of much discussion. Punch has been identified with Pontius Pilate, Judy with Judas the betrayer, or with the Jews—and the play with one of the old "Mysteries." This notion is entirely without foundation, the Detroit News declares. The name Punch is simply a contraction of Punchinello (for Pulcinello, the huffoon of Neapolitan comedy), while Judy is probably derived from Judith, at one time a common name.

It is said that a character similar to Punch is founded in the puppet plays of Italy, Egypt, Persia, India, China, and Japan. Punch and Judy shows were introduced into London in 1668, by an Italian, who erected a booth near Charing Cross for their performance.
