5:30 Basket Picnic, refreshments and recreation Weiner and marshmallow roast.

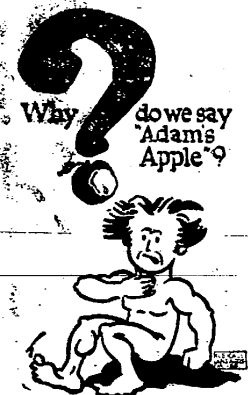
