The Morris bridge on the Almond road claimed another victim about 12:20 o'clock Wednesday morning when Kenneth Burdick, 16 years old son of Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Burdick of Canisteo, was crushed against one of the steel girders and died almost instantly. A careful investigation was made but the driver of the car, Raymond McChesney of Hornell was held blameless.

With a party of friends the Burdick boy had been attending a dance at Maple Grove, just off the Almond road above the Goff bridge and was on his way home at the time. When the dance ended, Burdick asked McChesney for a ride home and was told there was no room, as there were five others in the car besides the driver.

However, the Burdick boy crouched on the running board unbeknown to McChesney. As the car swung onto the bridge Burdick was caught between the side of the structure and the machine. His head struck one of the steel girders and his skull was crushed like an eggshell.

The unfortunate lad was a nephew of Wm. Childs of Andover. Funeral services will be held this (Friday) afternoon.
