Mrs. Betsey Kingsbury

Mrs. Betsey Bassett Kingsbury, died August 14, 1924, at the home of her son in Cuba, N. Y., at the age of 97 years.

Deceased was the daughter of John C. and Martha St. John Bassett and the last survivor of a family of fourteen children. Her parents were among the pioneer settlers of Allegany County, coming from Vermont State, more than 120 years ago, taking up a homestead at Independence when the hills and valleys were an unbroken forest.

Mrs. Kingsbury has lived her long and useful life in this county, and was well known in Andover, where she was a frequent visitor, and where she passed several winters in the homes of her brothers, the late John C. and Frank M. Bassett. She is survived by two sons, George H. Kingsbury of Cuba and William C. Kingsbury of Friendship, several grand and great grandchildren and a host of nephews and nieces.

Funeral services were held at her home in Cuba, Sunday, and burial made at Hardy's Corners.

Lad Killed at Stanards

Carl, eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Graves, living a mile from Stanards on the Hallsport road, was knocked down and run over by a heavy truck loaded with logs and driven by James Gilybury of Belvidere, Monday afternoon. The child was rushed to the Wellsville hospital but died without regaining consciousness. Carl was playing ball with children near his home and as the ball was thrown across the highway, ran to get it. A touring car, standing by the roadside, hid the oncoming truck which was on the child before he or the driver saw the other. It was a sad tragedy but no blame is attached to the driver.

Bolivar Man Injured

Leo Root of Bolivar was run over by a Fordson tractor as he was at work shidding timbers at Coon Hollow. The chain anchoring the tractor broke, allowing the machine to fall on him. Both of his legs and his ankle were broken and his knee crushed and thigh lacerated.
