

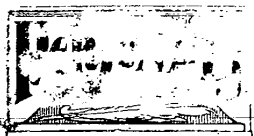
SURE TO ARISE

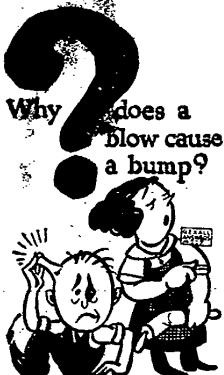
