HIGHLIGHTS ON STATE CROPS

From New York State Dept. Farms & Markets

Champion Grapes Arrive
Hudson Valley grapes of the Champion variety made their first appearance of the season on the New York City market early this week. Prices, according to the Department of Farms and Markets, ranged from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per 12-quart basket and from \$1.25 to \$1.75 per 8-basket carrier.

Cauliflower Receipts Heavy
Cauliflower was in heavy receipt on Tuesday from the Catskill district. Shipments from Long Island are steadily increasing. Latest prices are: Catskill \$2.50 to \$4.00 per crate for No. 1, Long Island \$1.50 to \$2.50.

Other Vegetables
Latest prices on other state products are as follows: Lettuce \$1.50 to \$2.50 per crate, romaine 50 cents to \$1.25; carrots 90 cents to \$1.00; per bushel basket; cucumbers mostly \$1.75 per bushel basket; green, round beans \$2.00 to \$3.25 per bushel basket.

Eggs and Cheese Steady
The market on eggs and cheese closed steady on Tuesday. Latest prices are: nearby henery whites, average extras 50 to 53 cents per dozen, extra firsts 45 to 49, firsts 40 to 44; nearby henery browns, extra 44 to 48 cents, extra firsts 38 to 41 cents. Fresh whole milk cheese, flats average run 19 cents per pound.

Butter weaker
The butter market closed weak with prices on Tuesday about one cent lower than the previous week. Latest prices are: creamery, higher score, butter 38 1/2 to 39 1/2 cents, extra 38 to 38 1/2 cents, seconds 33 1/2 to 35 1/2 cents.

Live Poultry Lower
Under heavy receipts and only normal trading prices have declined 2-3 cents per pound lower than a week ago. Latest prices are: Fowls, colored 24 to 26 cents per pound, leghorn 20 to 23 cents; chickens, colored 30 cents, leghorn 28 to 30 roosters 17 cents.

Country Dressed Calves Steady
Choice handy weight calves are in demand, but heavy weights and coarse calves are not wanted. Prices are unchanged since last week with choice bringing 19 to 20 cents per pound, fair to good 14 to 18 cents, common and small 10 to 14 cents.

Hay Steady
The demand has been good on top grades of hay but somewhat inactive on lower grades. No. 1 timothy bringing \$30 to \$31 per ton; No. 2 \$27 to \$29; No. 3, \$24 to \$26.

Grain

Grain market decline checked. Favorable weather and heavy receipts of wheat caused six days declining market on wheat, corn and oats. Big wheat export sales a strong factor in Monday's rally. Cash grain lower with futures. Receipts of wheat lighter in southwest but movement increasing and heavy movement of spring wheat expected.

Hay

Hay market steady. Best grades scarce at most markets, allowing medium grades to be worked. Large percentage of new hay arriving in heating condition. Timothy steady with light receipts. Alfalfa firm on slightly more active demand. Quoted August 25: No. 1 timothy Boston \$30, New York \$30.50, Pittsburgh \$20, Cincinnati \$20, Chicago \$25.50, St. Louis \$24.50, Kansas City \$19, Memphis \$23, Denver \$19. No. 1 alfalfa Kansas City \$20, Omaha \$15.50, Denver \$14, Memphis \$26.50. No. 1 prairie Kansas City \$11.25, Omaha \$13, Chicago \$18, St. Louis \$16.50, Minneapolis \$17.

Feed

Break in grain prices responsible for extreme weakness in Kansas City and easier tendency in northwestern markets. Wheat feeds declined approximately \$1.50-2 per ton. Gluten feed prices held firm, offerings good and slightly exceeding demand. Hominy feed shade easier, demand fair, offerings increasing. Cottonseed meal new crop offerings were affected by rather favorable cotton crop report.

Dairy Products
Butter markets generally firm. Production continues heavy. Storage holdings being added to despite the surplus over last year. Firm foreign markets have temporarily resulted in some butter being shipped to England. Closing wholesale prices on 92 score: New York 38 1/2; Chicago 36 1/2; Phila. 39 1/2; Boston 39.

Cheese markets easier and trad-

ing lighter. Heavy storage surplus and continued heavy production are factors of importance. Price changes during the week slight. Closing prices: Wisconsin primary markets Aug. 23: Twins 18c; Single Daisies 19c; Double Daisies 18 1/2c; Longhorns 19 1/2c; Square Prints 20 1/2c.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices range from steady to 5c higher than a week ago, closing at \$10 for the top and \$8.80-9.80 for the bulk. Medium and good beef steers 5-20c lower at \$6.75-10.40; butcher cows and heifers steady to 35c higher at \$3.60-10.25; feeder steers steady at \$4.50-8.25; light and medium weight veal calves 25c-1.25 higher at \$9.50-13.75; fat lambs 25-40c lower at \$11.75-13.85; feeding lambs steady at \$11.25-13.25; yearlings 50c lower at \$8-11 and fat ewes 75c-1 lower at \$3.75-7. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets were: Cattle and calves 62,582; hogs 4,827; sheep 67,990. In eastern wholesale fresh meat markets beef is 50c-1 higher; veal and lamb firm to \$2 higher; mutton weak to \$2 lower and pork loins \$2 lower to \$1 higher. August 25 prices good grades meats: Beef \$15-17.50; veal

\$17-24; lamb \$25-27; mutton \$14-16; light pork loins \$24-28; heavy loins \$13-19.

Long Island bulk Irish Cobbler \$1.40-1.45 in New York. Kansas sacked Irish Cobbler 15c lower in Chicago at \$1.15-1.30 carlot sales; branded stock 90c cash to growers in the Kaw Valley district. Cantaloupes weak. California turlock section salmon tints ranged \$2.25-3.25 per standard 45 in city markets. Maryland and Delaware stock mostly \$1.25-1.50. Peaches firm to stronger. North Carolina Elbertas \$3-3.50 per six bushel carrier and bushel basket in New York and Phila. New Jersey Belles \$1.75-2.25 in New York. Maryland and Delaware Belles \$1.50-2.25 in eastern cities. Massachusetts yellow onions, Japanese sets, \$3.25 sacked per 100 pounds in Phila., \$2.85-3 f.o.b. Connecticut Valley points. New York yellow varieties \$2-2.90 in New York, \$2-75-3.50 elsewhere.
