"To this we would add a warning against those who would restore the function of the paralyzed limb by the use of massage or other manipulations. In the early stages of the disease this is the worst kind of treatment. Later much can be done to restrain the muscles, but it requires the services of an orthopedic surgeon."

Since June, 1924, there have been 186 cases of infantile paralysis, 300 of them having developed during August. The following places report ten or more cases since June 12; Fulton, 10 and the town of New Haven, Oswego county, 10.

"Remember that you should suspect infantile paralysis if your child is alling and any of the following conditions are present:

# SILVER FOX RANCH **LOCATES AT ALBION**

# Will Begin Operations Oct. 1st. Animals Used for Breeding.

Albion, Sept. 15.—The Albion Silver Fox Ranch, one of the largest ranches of its kind in this part of the country, representing an outlay of over \$350,000, will open on October 1, 1924, with 230 breeding foxes to start with. The ranch is located in the town of Albion on the million dollar highway, just east of the municipal waterworks reservoir at Moshers Hill.

It is a thirty-acre tract on a sightly location, formerly the Geo. Van Ostrand farm which was recently purchased by Republican county committee chairman Irving W. Weet, of Shelby and Floyd Austin of Medina, who have started the ranch with Bruce Arnold, an expert from the Clarkson Silver Fox Ranch at Clarkson, Ont., as superintendent. The ranch will be a sales, breed-

The ranch will be a sales, breeding and board ranch where visitors will be admitted free. The old frame dwelling on the farm has been remodeled into a fine stucco office and headquarters for the manager.

remodeled into a fine stucco office and headquarters for the manager. The 115 pair of breeding foxes with which the ranch will start will be shipped to Albion from the Henderson Harbor Fox Farm and the Clarkson Silver Fox Ranch. The portion of the ranch where the pens are located is surrounded by a matched lumber board fence eight feet high and over 2,500 feet long. The interior is divided in three sections, each 100 by 300 feet in size with a 50-foot open section between each breeding section to seperate the animals in case of disease etc., becoming prevalet in any of the sections. There are forty-eight pens in each-section. They are of the open-air type screened bottom, top and sides and thirty-eight feet long, eight feet wide and six feet long, eight feet wide and six feet high. The tower for mixing feed and to be used as a look-out on the ranch his on a high elevation at the north end of the inclosure.

There are three houses on the tranch which extends north from the

There are three houses on the ranch which extends north from the State Trunk Line Route, No. 30, known as the Million Dollar highway to the Phipps road. The foodstuff for the animals will be raised on the farm largely, and consists of vegetables, eggs, milk, meat and porridge. Each pair of fox is valued at about \$3,000. Some of those at the Albion Ranch will be owned by persons other than the ranch owners.
