LOCAL HAPPENINGS

—Blackberries are ripe.
—Grange Fair October 22.
—The Brown and Bailey cheese factory, adjoining the condensory, has been stuccoed.

—Two stores, the Vosberg Hotel building and barns, at Centerville were destroyed by fire, Sept. 18th.
—Saturday, the 27th, is the big day at the Odd Fellows fair at Belfast, with a parade at one p. m., and other features.

—The body of Miss Ruth Horton who died in a Buffalo hospital, Sept. 18, was taken to the home at Whitesville, for funeral and interment.

—The McDonnell and Brannen foundry building at Bolivar was badly damaged by fire Friday morning. The loss of patterns, case boxes and molds is a heavy loss.

—The State Convention of the D. A. R. will be held in Hornell, October 15-17, inclusive. Hundreds of delegates from all parts of the state are expected to be in attendance.

—Eight thousand five hundred and eighty-two persons were killed at railroad crossings in the United States during 1923, according to the official record of the U. S. Bureau of public roads.

—Alfred University has among its freshmen this year, two very young students in the persons of Joseph I. Horach, Jr., of Patterson, N. J., 15 years old and Claude Voorhees of Friendship, 16 years of age.

Cady Agency of Bolivar, 29 wells and 212 acres of territory on the Swarthout, Keller and Jordan farms on Jordan Hill, in the town of Clarksville and 3 1-2 miles from Bolivar. The purchasers are: John Karl of Olean, Joseph Karl of Allegany and W. J. Weller, a prominent lumberman, of Ellipticville. Messrs. Karl each has a three-eighths interest, while Mr. Wheeler has a one fourth interest.

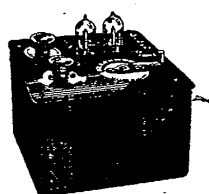
