Hornell, Sept. 20.—Farmers, deputized by state troopers, claim they caught Charles Abbott, former police officer, here, red-handed in the act of swooping down on a chicken coop Tuesday night near Almond.

Abbott has been released on his own recognizance. He will be given a trial by jury in Belmont, Tuesday morning. Attorney John W. Hollis is appearing for him.

Farmers claim that after missing more than \$1,200 worth of chickens many of them blooded stock, as well as much produce, they decided to watch. A small army of them was rewarded Tuesday night when, it is alleged, seven automobiles parked near chicken-coops, in which were hundreds of birds.

The farmers claim that Abbott got out and began to reconnoiter. They seized him. Men in the other machines made their escape. Abbott was taken before Justice of the Peace George H. Crandall. A warrant was formally served. He is charged with attempted larceny.

### THE CLOSE OF A USEFUL LIFE

Nelson L. McKay Dies at His Home in Walden. Former Andover Resident.

Nelson L. McKay, one of Walden's most highly respected citizens, died in his home early on Saturday morning, following an illness of several years. He was known in Walden as one of the finest types of manhood. Of quiet disposition, he was a very likeable and congenial character. His illness had been brot on in his work as a knife grinder, and he left the factory life a few years ago, taking up the making of fishing tackle, work at which he was an expert. He made artificial flies, and was one of the best fly-fishermen in this section. His artificial flies were in such great demand that he could not meet the demand. For the past few years he had made his summer home along the streams in the Catskills where many well known fishermen visited the shack in which he was quartered with his pal, Walter Sheldon, who was with him when the end came.

Having known several serious accidents in the pocket knife grinding trade, one of which was the fatal injury of the late Fred Sommer-set, Mr. McKay set out to devise a hood which would retain the broken pieces of grinding wheels after they had exploded. It seemed impossible for grinders sit upon a wooden horse over the running stone as they work. They use the top surface of the wheel, working with elbows upon their knees and sitting in a stooping position. Mr. McKay stuck to his task and finally the local factory managements conceived that his ideas were worth trying out. A hood was made along the ideas set down by him. Trials were made with the hood upon the stones. While the stones were running at high speed, a high powered rifle bullet was fired at the stone to make the stone explode. The flying pieces of stone were all confined in the trough below the hood. Several tests proved the device was a perfect piece of protection to grinders. The device is now used in every knife factory in this country and in some factories abroad. Mr. McKay was a past president of the Walden Sportsmen's Club.

Mr. McKay was 42 years old and was born in Eldred, Pa. He is survived by his wife and two children, Miss Jessie, aged 18 and a son, Nelson, Jr., aged 8; also by his mother, Mrs. George McKay and three sisters, Mrs. Albert Johnson and Mrs. George Osterman of Port Allegany, Pa., Mrs. Harry Hill of Bradford,
