—Alice Hower underwent a surgical operation at Jones Memorial hospital, Wellsville, Friday morning.
—Miss Ella B. Wright entertained the Delta Rho Club at the home of Mrs. Wm. Woodruff last Friday evening.
—A Bolivar business man says since his wife has to have her hair trimmed every week his overhead expenses have increased.
—Robert Brundage is suffering with a badly smashed thumb, resulting from getting it caught in the safe door at the Brundage Drug store.
—A second warning has been sent out by the State Tax Department warning autoists against adorning the windshields of their cars with bathing beauties or any other sort of "stickers."
—James F. Care of Bolivar recently participated in a clay pigeon shoot at Silver Lake, which was held by the Warsaw Gun Club. There were ten contestants, Mr. Care winning third prize, a mahogany cigar stand.
—Last week's Alfred Sun published a fine half-tone picture of The Steinheim, a beautiful stone structure erected on the University Campus by the late President Allen and bequeathed by him to the University. The Steinheim is worth a visit, not only for its beauty of architecture, but also its collection of curios and antiques, gathered from all parts of the world.
—Earl Nichols of Salt Rising, near Bolivar was severely hurt last Wednesday while at work teaming on the Sawyer & Marlin lease in Daggett Hollow. The rig builders were taking down a mast drilling rig and when nearly lowered, while there was still a strain on the rig, something gave way and the mast swung around, catching Mr. Nichols and pinning him fast on a pile of lumber.
—Charles F. Streeter of Bolivar and Roy A. Streeter of Wichita, Kan., have deposited with the State Bank of Bolivar a deed of trust and a check for \$3,000, payable to the Bolivar Free Library. The fund is to be known as the Mary E. Streeter and Ralph W. Streeter Memorial Fund, the principal sum to be invested in real estate mortgages or bonds, legal for New York State savings banks and the income therefrom to be used for the purchase of new books for the library. The fund is to be administered by the trustees of the library.
—After one indictment, charging him with making a public nuisance of his hotel near Addison, had been dismissed, Rush Moore, proprietor of a hotel near Woodhull, pleaded guilty to another indictment against him which charged him with burglarizing, third degree, and was given a six months' jail sentence, with a \$50 fine, by Judge Edwin S. Brown, at the special term of county court in Bath, Sept. 24. The jail sentence was suspended, however, on condition that Moore dispose of his hotel interest in Woodhull and never again enter that business in the county.

HALLOWELL AND GIRL CAUGHT

Missing Pair Are Found in Batavia and Are Brought Back Home.

Canisteo, Sept. 29.—Leon Hallowell and Jennie Larrow were apprehended at Batavia Friday at the instigation of Chief of Police Albert Burns of this place who went to Batavia Friday and brot the pair to Canisteo Saturday morning.
Hallowell, who is married and has two small children, alleged to have left town in company with Jennie Larrow, is held on a charge of abandonment under Section 840 of the Penal Law.
Both Hallowell and Miss Larrow were arraigned before Justice Geo. Potter, Saturday at which arraignment Hallowell waived examination and was held in \$500 bail furnished by his father, to appear before the grand jury. The Larrow woman was released in the custody of her father and her case will be disposed by trial November 17.

The Hallowells are well known in this village where they have resided for the past several years. They have two small children, one aged two years and the other a baby born but a few weeks ago. Mrs. Hallowell is an attractive and capable young woman with a pleasing disposition. Miss Larrow and Hallowell were both employees of the Up-to-Date Advertising Company.
The Hallowell-Larrow case has attracted much attention in Canisteo and vicinity for the past week and its progress will be watched with interest.

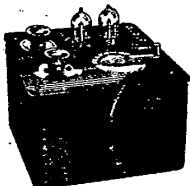
