BELMONT DAM SAVES STATE ROAD

Highest Water in Years Going Over Dam With Many Tools and Material Lost.

(Wellsville Daily Reporter)

Belmont, Sept. 30.—The highest water in the Genesee river for the past five years was registered here this morning and had it not been for the new state dam, but recently finished, it is believed the river would have worked into the state highway and destroyed a large portion of the state road. As it is, there is no current noticeable along the bank and the high water is sweeping over the new dam in safety.

The Oatka Construction company which has been working on the contract all summer, had just finished the apron on Saturday, and there was still considerable work to be done on a retaining wall, but the flood, starting in last night, buried up all their tools and machinery. A Ford tractor, several pumps, 2,000 feet of lumber, a pile of coal and other supplies are either buried in mud and gravel or have gone down the stream, while the tall gin pole, which was used for distributing the concrete to different portions of the dam, while supposedly safely anchored, gave way this morning and is now on its way to Rochester.

Q. The great volume of water coming thru the central part of the dam, it was feared that the abutment to the highway bridge might be weakened and this morning the bridge was closed to traffic, sending travelers around by the lower bridge. Traffic will not be opened again until the water has subsided so that an examination can be made of the abutment.

He had been here about two weeks, leaving for his home Wednesday morning.

Mrs. Wilcox's condition became suddenly so aggravated that she was taken to the hospital for relief, where she passed away Thursday morning.

Funeral services will be held at the Presbyterian church Sunday afternoon at 2:30.

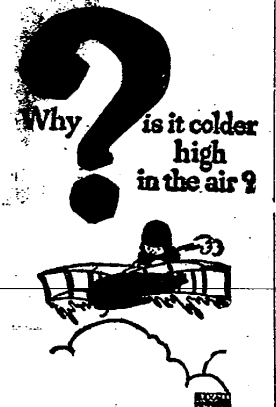
