—Mrs. Martha Orvis is at the home of her son, Ernest Orvis, where she is suffering from an attack of sciatica rheumatism.

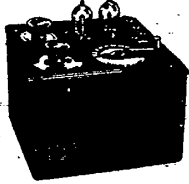
—Merle Crittenden of Whitesville was shot in the leg while hunting last week. He was taken to the Wellsville hospital where the bullet was extracted.
