## Tribute to Woodrow Wilson

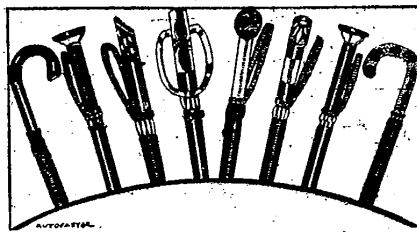
