Children May Solve the Great Traffic Problem

Washington, D. C., Oct. 15.—Can and as many medals will be given children solve the traffic problem? In connection with the forth national safety educational campaign announced today by the Highway Education Board. American school children are to be given an opportunity to answer the vexing question that now engages the attention of the best engineering minds of the country.

The announcement offers more than \$6,500 in cash prizes and medals to elementary school teachers who submit the best essays and the best lessons in the 1924 national essay and national lesson contests. Officials of the board are not optimistic enough to believe, it is said, that any final solution will come from the essays by children, but it is believed that a nation-wide consideration of the traffic problem will have a beneficial effect in reducing the number of accidents and fatalities on streets and highways.
