

# CLEMENT BRASTED KILLED IN STORM

Wind Upset Wagon on Which He Was Riding. Neck Was Broken.

During the miniature hurricane that swept over this section late Saturday afternoon, Clement M. Brasted, 63 years old, was thrown from a rig near his home in Almond and killed. His lifeless body was found some time later and after an investigation, Coroner H. H. Cooley, of Wellsville, granted a certificate of accidental death.

Mr. Brasted was working in a field, in the rear of the barn and was riding on a light farm wagon on which there was a wide rack. While no one saw the accident, the indications are that the sudden gust of wind upset the wagon and pitched Mr. Brasted out on his head. The examination disclosed the fact that his neck was broken.

Forrest Sisson was plowing in the field nearby and after the blizzard had passed he happened to glance across and saw Mr. Brasted's team standing in the field. After several minutes had passed without anyone coming to them he became suspicious and went to investigate. He found Mr. Brasted's lifeless body nearby. The rack was tipped up and several of the boards were scattered about, indicating the storm had struck with unusual violence in that particular spot. In fact, the wind rose to the velocity of a hurricane for a few minutes but quickly subsided.

Dr. Howard S. Brasted of Hornell city, was summoned and he had the body removed to the house. He summoned Coroner H. H. Cooley of Wellsville, who granted permission for bringing the body to Robertson's funeral home where it was prepared for burial. Coroner Cooley and Coroner Burch completed the investigation, Sunday, after which Coroner Cooley issued the certificate.

Mr. Brasted had been a resident of Almond for upwards of 25 years and was very well known in that locality. He was a member of the Almond Baptist church and besides his widow, is survived by one daughter, Miss Ethel Brasted, at home; three sons, Delbert of Almond; Leon of Detroit, Mich.; and Ralph Brasted of Hornell, and one brother Orin Brasted of Castle. There are also four grandchildren.

The funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the Union church of Almond and at 2:15 p. m. at the house. Burial in Woodlawn cemetery at Almond.

# DRY AGENTS TO CLEAN UP STEUBEN

Cities of Corning and Hornell Being Given Much Attention.

Hornell, Dec. 15.—Inauguration of a vigilant crusade to make Steuben county as dry as the proverbial bone was forecasted here today. The drive has already been started in Corning, where a number of arrests have been made and it was said that Bath, Hornell, Canisteo and other places are in line for a similar cleanup.

It is an open secret that several prohibition sleuths have been working in Hornell for several days. They adopted the same method as in Corning, where they donned working clothes and attempted to pass themselves off as shop employees. It is reported that they obtained drinks in two or three places in Hornell by this ruse and that arrests will follow.

It is predicted that the "mopping-up" forces will swoop down on the city within a few days and make a number of raids, altho so far no tangible proof of their visit has been felt.

That the law is enforced in Hornell better than in almost any city in the state is evidenced by the fact that not a single arrest for intoxication was made in Hornell on six days of last week. Only two were made in the entire week and it is said that it is growing harder and harder to obtain a drink of anything in Hornell.
