HIGHLIGHTS ON STATE CROPS

From New York State Dept. Farms and Markets Dec. 16, 1924.

The colder weather at the first of the week tended to slow down trading in vegetables. The celery market is holding steady for good quality with supplies somewhat more plentiful. The fanciest state celery in the rough sold wholesale Tuesday at \$2.50-2.75 per two-thirds crate, off-grade at \$2.00-2.25. California celery brot \$4.75-5.50 per large crate. Potato supplies in the railroad yards are liberal and the market dull. Western New York No. 1 Round Whites in bulk have lately brot \$1.90-2.45 per 130 lbs. Northern New York No. 1's from \$2.15-2.35. Cabbage is plentiful and prices lower due to a limited outlet. Jobbing transactions of white Danish on Tuesday were principally at \$16-18 per ton. New crop Wakefield stock from South Carolina brot \$1.75 per 1-2 bushel hamper. Onions were plentiful and few sales exceeded \$2.50 per 100-pound sack.

Kieffer Pears Steady, Apples Dull
The limited quantity of Western New York Kieffer pears offered has met a ready sale. That of 2 1-2 inch size on Tuesday brot \$5.25 per barrel, 2 1-4 inch, 3.75 and 2 inch \$2.75. The apple market suffers from slow trading which is partly relieved by the fact that arrivals lately have been only moderate both from this and other states. "A" 2 1-2 inch Greenings have lately sold at \$5-6.50 per barrel, McIntoshes \$6.75-9.50, Calhines \$5.25-5.50, Stayman Winesap \$5.50, Kings \$5-5.50, Hubbardston \$3.50-4 and Baldwin \$5-6.

Live Calves and Lambs in Demand
Owing to the partial embargo on live poultry as well as the popular impression concerning the poultry, a shift there has been a perceptible shift from live fowls to live calves and lambs. As a result, calves advanced \$1-1.50 per hundredweight on Monday and live lambs advanced 50c per hundred weight. Dressed calves are slow with choice selling at 17c per pound, fair to good 12 to 16 cents, common and 10 to 12 cents, under 50 pounds, 8 to 10 cents.

Butter Recovers, Eggs Higher
The butter market has recovered some of its losses. Closing prices: per pound were: 92 score, 44 1/2c; higher score 45-45 1/2c. Eggs are firm and westerns are higher. Nearby henry whites are unchanged with average extras at 68-72c per dozen and extra firsts 65-67c.

Cheese continues steady with average run whole-milk flats at 21 1/2-22c for fresh and at 22-23c for held. Hay Steady to Firm, Light Receipts
Hay receipts have been light, the demand active and the market steady to firm. Closing prices per ton U. S. Timothy No. 1, \$26-27; No. 2, \$24-25; No. 3, \$22-23; Sample, \$18-20.

Fruits and Vegetables
Potato markets irregular. New York sacked round whites \$1.10-1.25 per 100 pounds in eastern cities; mostly around 85c f.o.b., Rochester. Maine bulk Green Mountains \$1.25-1.30 in New York; 60c f.o.b., Presque Isle. Northern sacked round whites \$1.10-1.15 in a few markets, 90-95c for quality carlot sales in Chicago; 70-75c f.o.b. Sweet potatoes unsettled. Delaware and Maryland yellow varieties mostly \$2-2.50 per bushel hamper, top of \$2.75 in Pittsburgh. New Jersey yellows \$2-50-53 Tennessee. Nancy Halls \$2-25-2.50 in Cincinnati and Chicago. Danish type cabbage from New York closed slightly weaker at \$15-20 bulk per ton in eastern cities, top of \$25 in Cincinnati and St. Louis; steady at \$12-14 f.o.b., Rochester. Midwestern onions continued firm at \$2.50-3 sacked per 100 pounds in consuming centers; \$2.50 f.o.b. West Michigan points. New York yellows ranged \$2.25-3 in eastern cities. New York Baldwin apples sold in small lots at \$6 per barrel in New York. New York Rhode Island Greenings mostly \$5-5.50. Northwestern extra fancy Winesaps \$3.25-3.50 per box in Chicago.

Live Stock and Meats
Chicago hog prices ranged from 15-30c higher than a week ago, closing at \$9.85 for the top and \$8.50-9.40 for the bulk. Medium and good beef steers 80-75c lower at \$8.50-12.50; butcher cows and heifers 65c-1 lower at \$3-10.75; feeder steers steady to 50c lower at \$4.25-7; light and medium weight veal calves steady to \$1 lower at \$8-10; fat lambs 25-70c higher at \$14-16.35; feeding lambs 25-50c higher at \$13-15.75; yearlings 25c higher at \$10.25-13.50 and fat ewes steady to 20c lower at \$9-10.50. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending Dec. 5 were: Cattle and calves 65,730; hogs 4,407; sheep 50,609. In eastern wholesale fresh meat markets beef and veal are steady to \$1 lower; lamb and mutton firm to \$1 higher and pork loins \$1 lower to 50c higher. December 15 prices good grade meats: Beef \$14-18; veal \$14-17; lamb \$22-23; mutton \$13-17; light pork loins \$15.50-17; heavy loins \$13-15.

Dairy Products
Butter market's steady to firm at close of week although unsettled when the week opened. Storage butter movement somewhat lighter although still relatively heavy. Reports indicate increase in make. Storage report released during week showed the butter holdings on December as 100,743,000 pounds, a reduction of 35,000,000 pounds under the Nov. 1 report but still 37,000,000 pounds above the five year average. Closing wholesale prices of 92 score butter today: New York 45c; Chicago 44 1/2c; Phila. 46c; Boston 42c.

Cheese markets fairly firm and active at advances averaging 1-1c over previous week. Factors of firmness appeared to be good demand together with light supplies of fancy goods and light arrivals of current make. Seasonal defects appearing in latter. Monthly storage report revealed December 1 holdings amounting to 58,718,000 lbs. which was a surplus over last year of but 3,613,000 pounds. Hay
Hay market firm. Colder weather offsetting pre-holiday dullness. Timothy steady to strong. Alfalfa and prairie firm with slightly higher prices. Quoted Dec. 15: No. 1 timothy Boston \$26.50; New York \$26.50; Pittsburgh \$21; Cincinnati \$19.50; Chicago \$24; St. Louis \$24; Kansas City \$17.50; Memphis \$24; Denver \$18.75. No. 1 alfalfa Kansas City \$22.25; Omaha \$18; Denver \$16.50; Memphis \$30. No. 1 prairie Kansas City \$12.25; Omaha \$12.50; Chicago \$18; St. Louis \$17-25; Minneapolis \$16.50.

Feed market higher with grain but demand limited as trade is buying only for most pressing needs at present price level. Corn feeds firm on light production. Quoted Dec. 15: Minneapolis spring bran \$30.50; Standard middlings \$31; 34% linseed meal \$46.50. Chicago gluttenfeed \$39.89; yellow hominy feed \$48. 36% cottonseed meal \$46.50. 60% digester feeding tankage at various markets, \$60.

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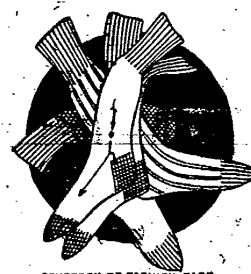
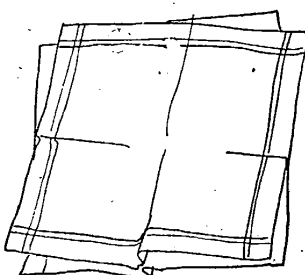
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REDEMPTION NOTICE
