—The various Andover Bible Schools, have held appropriate Christmas exercises the past week.

—Sheriff-elect Bennett of Short Tract, has appointed Bruce Mills of Fillmore as turnkey at the county jail.

—In 1922 and 1923 McKean county, Pa., which adjoins Allegany county, had one divorce for every five and one-half marriages, according to state statistics.

—The Entre Nous Club and their gentlemen friends, held their annual Christmas tree and turkey dinner at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Temple, Tuesday evening.

—That most favored Christmas carol, "Silent Night, Holy Night" will be sung with particular devotion this year as it is just 100 years since it was first sung as a Yuletide celebration.

—The Alfred Sand & Gravel Corporation has secured an option on land from the sand bank to No. 4 railroad bridge for the purpose of putting in a switch or pipe line for loading the sand.

—Twenty-nine rural communities in New York state are appealing to the state department of health to aid them in getting physicians. Some communities have voted to pay certain amounts annually in addition to fees.

WHEAT STOLEN

Arrest Expected of Man
100 Bushels from Canaseraga Man.

Canaseraga, Dec. 20.—One hundred bushels of wheat were stolen from the barns of James Fawcett, just north of this village, it was discovered Friday morning and the supposed culprit was quickly traced.

A feed store in Hornell admitted buying the wheat Friday morning and gave the name of the man who sold it to them. The theft is laid at the door of one of the newcomers in town. The state troopers made an investigation and a warrant was sworn out, but for some reason the family decided not to serve it until today, when a hearing is to be held in the town hall before Justice C. K. Bacon.

Troupsburg, Dec. 20.—Mrs. Jenny Sanford Resue, 65 years old, fell down stairs yesterday, at her home here and was seriously hurt that she died this morning. She is survived by her husband, George Resue; two sons, Erwin Holt of Jasper and Herman Holt of Troupsburg.

Mrs. Resue formerly lived in Jasper for many years and leaves many to mourn her loss. She was a sister to the late Cassius Sanford of Hornell.
