Long Distance Forecasts

MANY people talk and write about the weather, as if Whithey had the authority of the weather bureau of United States department of agriculture for what i they say. Several recent occurrences illustrate the uppose that any statement regarding weather must isdoubtful forecast is made and circulated by some irresponsible person, many others accept it in good faith and act upon it in one way or another. Thus the ublic at large may unconsciously be misled to its own!

For example, predictions of a cold winter specically ascribed to the weather bureau have been used for advertising purposes in entire sincerity by some mmercial concern anxious to sell cold weather com modities—coal, or coats, or furs, or other things. The public is led to buy these articles because of the aparent authority of the statement. When actual conditions do not fulfill the prophecy, they feel disappointand inclined to distrust future statements issued the weather bureau, even when they contain imortant warnings.

> Apropos of this type of prediction, the weather tureau has steadily maintained that it cannot at presnt attempt to make forecasts for months, seasons or verus in advance, nor does it believe that this is feasi-in de with data now available to meteorologists. herefore confines its forecasts to those made daily or or a week in advance, also for aspects of the weather, progress across the country can be anticipated with ome degree of accuracy.


