Letter From T. J. Gilbert, Describing New Orphanage and Infirmary at I. O.

On Sunday, June 26, an event of the greatest interest to all Rebekahs and Odd Fellows in the jurisdiction of New York State will be the dedication of the new orphanage and infirmary buildings. The corner stones of these buildings were laid on May 9, 1926, when large delegations were here from all sections c the state. On this same date will be unveiled a bronze tablet at the entrance of the orphanage in commemoration of the gift to the Grand Lodge Home by the Rebekah As-

The infirmary cottage was put in use on February 9th for the reception of the infirm residents, who had been in the main building, thus making available more rooms for many who had been for some time on the waiting list. This building is fully equipped with the latest to of steel hospital furniture, with small operating room, supplied with modern facilities for minor operations, in charge of competent trained nurses. The cost of this building, furnished complete, is approximately \$75,000. The orphanage building with furnishings, was built at a cost of about

\$100,000, which was financed by funds raised by the Rebekah State The exterior of the buildings are of native stone, relieved by a large amount of English half timber work, with the latest design of slate roofs The two new buildings are set at some distance from the main buildling, the orphanage to the north and

the infirmary to the south. The intervening spaces will be occupied by other buildings later. The orphanage building contains in the basement the following rooms -Dining room with handsome fire blace, kitchen, pantry, storage rooms, boys' coat room and toilet. girls' coat room and toilet. On the first floor there are a living room with a fire place, girls' room and toilet, same for boys, kindergarten and toilet and an ample staircase communication with the basement

and upper floors and at each end of the building a fire loggia. On the second floor is the girls' dormitory with bath and locker rooms at one end and the same for boys at the opposite end of the building. On this floor there are the matrons' and nurses' bed rooms with bath, a hospital room and a small children's room with bath. Doors in the main corridors separate the boys' and girls' sides of the building. On the third floor are four service rooms and bath.

Both buildings are equipped with sprinkling and ventillating systems, making them as near fire proof as The beds are all of the Simmond's brand. Everything possible has been done to make all the sildings sanitary and comfortable. The Home now has 76 residents, 6 of whom are in the Infirmary. The mortality has been greater than usual.
