



Havre St. Pierre is a village of 200 families, a metropolis for the south shore of Labrador. They get a living by hunting and trapping in the winter and in summer go up the St. Lawrence river to cut wood for the paper companies, being away from home all summer. We are very pleasantly located in

a native home, very fine and hospit-We expect to leave this place June 24 on S.S. North Shore for Harrinngton, where Dr. Grenfell's mission is locatted. The reason we have chosen these places to stop is because they are near government bird reserves which we want to visit. The air is crisp here about like early April at home. This morning fat 3 o'clock the sun was up and it

s visible until nearly 9 at night.
