



For bacon and eggs some receptacle is needed for frying, but hot dogs may be broiled to the individual taste on the ends of sharp sticks. One of the best ways to cook steak is to wrap it in two or three thickvesses of wrapping paper and put \ it in the embers of the fire for minutes.
