

From these statements some idea may be had of the great number of operations needed to make a more complicated gar-If the steps are thought out ahead of time in the exact order in which they are to be done, and then if each operation is performed in the leasiest and best way, many exasperating mistakes, such as cutting both sleeves for one arm, and similar blunders will be avoided. Things will run along smoothly and nerves will forget that they exist. If one is not in the habit of thinking ahead

in this way, it is a good plan to write on a piece of paper each step in order. If one is not quite sure of the best way to do each task, much dismay will be saved if one reads the directions before starting. The New York State College of Home Economics at Cornell University offers, thru the home bureaus, an extension course in home sewing, especially planned to prevent waste and nervousness.
