

FOR a long time the feminists have been claiming stealing their styles from 'em. I that this is a man's world, and along comes the statistician to prove it. The feminists insist that man is in the majority, and for this reason alone women should be strengthened in their political rights, to the end that they might partially overcome the handicap of nature.

There may be justice in their claims when we consider that there are 106 boys born for every 100 girls. But it is only at birth that males are thus six per cent.' in excess. The ratio in the actual living population pri as a whole is different, first, because death takes relatively greater toll among males than among females and, second, because there has been a prepor derance of males among immigrants entering the Uni' ed States. These two influences, obviously, work in opposite directions, but the net result is that in the total population there are in the United States 1 males to every 100 females.

It is, however, a pure accident that the ratio in v the actually living population in our own country so nearly the same as the ratio at birth.
