

That this effort has met with at least a measure of success is shown the decrease in the general death rate and by the les- CHURCHES thruout the country are sponsoring a sened number of deaths from other causes. While the statistics show that the United States has made commendable strides in the improvement public health, there is much yet to be accomplished before this country will achieve in public health the supremacy attained in other fields, for there are nine countries in the world with lower death rates than the United States.

The general opinion prevails that this 25 year record of a world wide campaign to make life more livable and longer was a cheerful one. There had been some serious setbacks, but more gains than losses. Among the 20 diseases considered, the death rates from 16 had been lowered, in most cases substantially. The fight' against cancer, diabetes, heart disease and influenza was not yet won, but there were good reasons to hope that the next quarter of a century would see even these enemies in retreat.


