BOILED EGGS ARE HARD TO DIGEST Should be Cooked at Low Tempera-

ture So Protein in White Will

Not Get Tough and Leathery. for high temperature makes whites of eggs tough and leathery. The thing to remember about cooking eggs, says the New York i State college of home economics at Ithaca, N. Y,, is that they contain a' large amount of protein and that protein cooked at a high temperature becomes tough and hard to digest. Cooking at a low temperature makes eggs tender. this method takes a little longer. boiler, for this keeps them at a low-stand of stronger plants. er temperature and makes them tento taste. Then pour them into a boiling water until they are firm.




