Around Our House

Suds and Sunshine for Blankets

Sunny spring days are the days for washing blankets. Every housekeeper takes pride in keeping her wool blankets fluffy and clean; with a good washing machine and wringer this is comparatively easy. On a warm bright morning fill the washer with hot water. If the water is hard, add a little ammonia o borax and enough soap jelly to make thick suds. Blankets absorb much - of the suds, so a heavier suds needed for them. Cool the water until it is a little more than lukewarm. Shake or brush the blankets well and put them in the suds, start the machine and, while it is working prepare another suds like the first, in a tub. Wring the blankets from the washer into the tub and put an-other pair in the washer. While the machine is washing the second pair use a hand plunger on those in the tub. Washing in the second sude removes any remaining dust as well! as the dirty first water. From the second suds wring the blanket into a tub of clear water the same temperature as the wash waters. Borax should also be added to this water if the water is hard.



Community Responsibility for Alfred University

For a good many years Andover has had one or more graduates from her High School in attendance at Alfred University. The average for ten years has been three per year. Every student costs the college \$300 more than he pays in tuition. In this way in the past ten years over \$9,000 of such educational help has been given to Andover students, as a free gift from Alfred University, in addition to scholarship aid to a number of students. Andover is discovering and appreciating as never before the big asset it has in having a "Class A" college right at hand.

Higher education is the benevolent task of society. Direct voluntary gifts or taxation are the only means of support for higher education. Benevolent people have put a million and a quarter dollars into the permanent endowment and equipment of Alfred University. The State has added a quarter of a million for technical courses. With such a community asset provided by benevolences, and with the rapidly growing number of our youth, eager and prepared for college, the community responsibility to keep up and enlarge this college plant to meet growing needs be-

Alfred's Trustees are benevolent people who give liberally and work with compensation for the good of society. They feel that a million dollars should be added to Alfred's equipment in the next ten years, if it is to serve the community properly, as it rounds out its first century.

The most urgent of Alfred's present needs is a gymnasium. This improvement cannot be delayed. An enrollment of 500 students, requiring two physical instructors make a gymnasium imperative. It is a community responsibility which should appeal to every citizen who believes in the education of the youth.

A competent committee in Andover is co-operating with the Trustees in the program for a gymnasium building.


