

THE department of commerce has been making a cost of production survey annually since 1922, in an ef-Relaxation is one of the main duties of life. fort to assist the farms of the United States to know how much it is costing them to raise corn, wheat and life. other grains, and the report for the 1927 crops has just been compiled by that department.

MIVE Russian engineers, found guilty and sentenced to death for conspiracy in the Donetz Basin mines, were executed this month in Moscow. They were exe-

cuted by a firing squad. These five men were said to be leaders in th anspiracy movement that resulted in 50 odd men being tried. Several German engineers were arrested (connection with the movement and for a time internafonal relations were affected by the arrests. None of the Germans, however, received long sentences


