More than 200 tons of silage from Cornell 11 variety of corn are al ready in the silo for feeding with the hay. The silage is of good quality but on account of the season there is less grain and more ragwood than would ordinarily be the ease, so that it can not be said that'

probably represents good average silage under New York conditions Twelve cows will be fed a grain mixture containing 20 per cent. total protein, 12 will be fed 16 per cent., and 12 24 per cent. Each cow will be weighed each week and the milk will be weighed after each milking. All grain mixtures have the same ingredients, the same content of mineral supplement and of total digestible nutrients. The cows! will be milked by a milking machine operated by the same man all the time so that the results of milking should be as near uniform as it is possible to get them. The efficiency of the three rations will be determined by the total milk and fat production of each group, the liveweight changes in the cows, and the condition of the cows at the beginning and at the end of the feeding experiment, as deter-' mined by three judges. Better use of pastures for animal feeding is sought by European farm-The studies of English investigators, who are foremost in the field of pasture management, have resulted in improved pastures and cheaper animal and milk production. Recently, they have found that the dry matter of pasture grass contains digestible protein and total digestible nutrients equal to a high protein concentrate. Since concentrates are expensive in England and there is pasture in abundance, experiments are in progress to try to

One experiment is in cutting the grass every two weeks, drying it ar ificially, pressing it into cakes, and storing it for winter feeding. As another means of preserving this grass, the silo is being used. 
