### MAJOR MILLS IS \$25,000 WINNER

mitting 19,000 plans. Half of the contestants were women. Prize plans were received from every state in the Union, the District of Columbia, every territorial possession of the United States and ten foreign countries. One was from a Brazilian general, another from an official of China.

New York State led in the number of plans submitted with 2,104 Pennsylvania was next with 1,455. California submitted 1,128. Wyoming submitted the smallest number among the states, only 22 plans.

Plans submitted ranged from suggested modification of the 18th Amendment, urged by 774, to jail sentences for all convictions and deportation of all alien offenders. Modification of the Volstead Act was urged by 5,340, while 1,536 favored government manufacture and sale of intoxicants, and 400 wanted light wines and beer.

"Diversion of alcohol and liquors under cover of indiscriminately granted permits controlled by unreliable persons provided the vast majority of liquor consumed today," Major Mills said in the preface to his plan. "The task of restricting and reducing permit holders to those reliable persons or corporations conducting a legitimate business is the main problem in enforcement."

"Any plan logically carried out and energetically pushed to a definite conclusion is better than no plan at all. Unfortunately except for the Coast Guard, the federal agencies charged with enforcement have never adopted any one plan and carried it through."

The Volstead Act, Major Mills

said, was well conceived and "the provisions are capable of enforcement with few if any legislative changes."

**His Suggestions**

1. Permissive. Close scrutiny of those to whom permits to manufacture alcohol are granted and closer government supervision of its making; issuance of only temporary permits, or not longer than six months duration; make each local administrator responsible for the issuance of the permits.
2. Enforcement. (A) Import; (B) domestic supply; for smuggling only unceasing vigilance is needed; for domestic enforcement, strike at the source, manufacture in private stills and illegal diversion under permits.
3. Political. Take the enforcement agencies out of politics. "Political interference is one of the serious handicaps of effective control," he said.
4. Detailed methods of controlling industrial alcohol; strict supervision of distilleries which denature their own alcohol; abolition, by legislation, of independent denaturing plants which Major Mills said "have no economic place in legitimate business;" adopt legislation, if the courts will not sustain such procedure, requiring manufacturers who use industrial alcohol to show such disposition as will allow the government to trace that alcohol to a legitimate dealer.
