## Automobile Deaths Decrease

RECENT report of the National Safety Council an-A nounces that deaths resulting from automobiles in 1932 decreased about 13 per cent. over 1931.. year's death toll was about 29,000, reports the council, or a decrease of 4,000 from the previous year.

This report is particularly encouraging since the death toll-from automobile accidents has steadily mount ed for several years despite efforts to the contrary. Increasing number of automobiles has been greatly rethe past years, but the death rates surpassed the ratio).


