The fellows who grow timothy and Clover for the seed are in exactly the same position as are our own people who grow potatoes. All who are able financially are holding onto their crop, hopeful that something will happen to raise prices.

In normal times with seed prices at present levels, buyers from Northern Europe would be carting it out of the country by the ship load, but they are short of funds, their money is worth less than ours, so the probability of their taking advantage of the situation is quite remote.

As present seed prices are ruling at considerably less than one-half the last five year average they seem very cheap, but at that it is evident that the money involved will be much more difficult to raise than was the larger amount in former years.

Our seed, as usual, is the best obtainable, the purity is above ninety-nine, high germination and no weeds. If you must economize on your seed, buy the best and sow less. Six quarts of this high quality will grow you a better crop and keep your land cleaner than twice the quantity of seed you will be offered for a few cents less per bushel.
