Westerly, R. I., Jan. 21.—Attorney William W. Moss of Providence, R. I., and Herbert G. Whipple of Yonkers, N. Y., counsel for Alfred University, today filed a list of 12 objections in Westerly probate court to the accounting of Judge Samuel H. Davis of this city as conservator of the estate of Miss Hannah Crandall, who left one-third of her \$40,000 estate to Alfred University.

The objections claim chiefly that Judge Davis paid out \$3,136 from the estate "in careless and negligent performance of his duties as conservator." It is alleged this money was paid by the conservator to himself for services rendered and the litigants claim this sum should have been credited to him against a \$5,600 note he owes the estate.
