

TRIM lines can be maintained or attained it is wholly a matter of diet and exercise. Proper weight cannot be gained safely by so-called reducing powders, soaps, or danger-

on fatty and stately foods: Ear plenty of freal green vege-tables and fresh fruits; drink plenty of milk, toristo juice, and orange juice; refrain from confections, putdings, pies and

pastry.

A. daily dozen" each morning, and a walk morning and evening, each about a mile, will give you ample exercise. A daily shower bath, or tub, if you prefer, will sid the skin to exude perspiration and eliminate body poisons.

No special diet is necessary. Just eat tewer fats, starchies and sugars. Above all, avoid reducing fads. Fat cannot be dissolved by baths, or sweated off or rolled off by massage rollers. It must be worked off.

Be sure that you are really over-weight before you undertake to reduce. Many young girls ruin their health by trying to be too thin. It is better, particularly during the adolescent years, for you to be a little heavier than the average.
