Alfred University

(Special to Andover News)
Alfred, N. Y.—Registration for the first and second semesters at Alfred University shows a total of 556 different students enrolled. Sixteen of these are new students, registering for the second semester. In addition there were over a hundred students attending summer school last summer. The total registration for the two semesters last year was 500, with 17 new students entering the second semester. This year only 12 students were dropped at the end of the first semester because of poor scholarship, but other students have been forced to leave because of financial difficulties so that even with the incoming 16 students, the total for the second semester is at present 12 below that of last semester, or 528, as compared to 540 last fall. Last year the registration was 483 the first semester, dropping to 467 the second, a loss of 16, as against 12 this year.

Ways To Use Honey

Do you know how to make use of healthful and inexpensive New York honey? Here is a suggestion:

HONEY BUTTER
Blend 1 to 2 cups (according to taste) granulated or creamed honey with 1/4 cup butter. Let butter stand at room temperature for ten minutes so that it blends more readily. If liquid honey is used, use same proportions, beating the honey first with strong double ball bearing type of egg beater. Then blend with warm butter. Pour in glass jar, screw cap on and place in refrigerator or some place where temperature is 55 degrees or lower. This makes a delicious spread for bread, toast, biscuits or hot cakes. Recipes in this series have been gathered by Consumers Information Service of the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets from state and Federal sources.
