Alfred, N. Y.—Registration for the first and second semesters at Alfred University shows a total of 556 different students enrolled. Sixteen of these are new students, registering for the second semester. In addition there were over a hundred students attending summer school last summer.

nancial difficulties so that even with

nancial difficulties so that even with the incoming 16 students, the total for the second semester is at pres-ent 12 below that of last semester, or 528, as compared to 540 last fall.
