Alfred, N. Y., Feb. 28.—"Poetry is the halo around science," was one of the statements made by Edwin Markham, "dean of American poets" as he held his audience almost breathless with interest for two hours thru interpretation of his poems and his philosophies of poetry in Alumni Hall last week.

He read from a number of his volumes: Shoes of Happiness, Gates of Paradise, and Eighty Songs at Eighty, his latest volume. He opened his readings with "Child of My Heart," which was written to his son Virgil, four, now a man of 35, and writing mystery stories. As a concluding poem he read "Lincoln: The Man of the People," but by request from the floor read "The Man With the Hoe," probably his most famous poem, first printed in a San Francisco newspaper in 1898. Other poems he read were: Poet Love, How the Great Guest Came, A Look Into the Gulf, A Prayer, Joy of the Hills, Man Making, A Judgment House, The Needless Solar System, The Look Ahead, The New Trinity, Romantic Love, Araby, Power, the latter five being from Eighty Songs at Eighty.
