The dictionary defines a machine as "Any device consisting of two or more resistant relatively constrained parts, which, by a certain predetermined intermotion may serve to transmit and modify force and self as one. motion so as to produce some given effect, or to do' some kind of desired work."

This labored definition can be boiled down to the exceedingly well. following: A machine is an instrument for the conversion of one form of energy into another.
