HOW TO HAVE GOOD TEETH

HE secret of healthful and beautiful teeth lies in proper L diet and proper care. Unless you eat the right foods you cannot expect to have pretty teeth or to be free of toothache and other dental troubles.

The teeth, like the bones, are made principally of minerals, especially calcium and phosphorus, which must be taken into the body with the food. The substances necessary for bones and teeth are all contained, in various combinations, in fresh green vegetables, in fruits and cereals, and especially in milk and dairy products.

A quart of milk a day, taken either as a beverage or in foods that are cooked with milk, will give you an adequate supply of calcium and phosphorus. You should always take at least one large glass of milk at every meal for your general health and for the good of your teeth.

You should brush your teeth morning and night and after each meal. Any good tooth powder or paste will do, for all any dentifrice can do is clean the teeth.
