At the beginning of the third quarter the Andover boys put on a rally that seemed for a time as if it would close the gap, but the Angelica team came back with a rally of their own to have a lead of 34-14 at the end of the quarter.

In the last quarter the Andover team was again outscored, this time by four points as Andover scored six points to Angelica's ten.

The final score was Angelica 44, Andover 20.
