Ways To Use Honey

Do you know how to make use of beautiful and inexpensive New York honey? Here is a suggestion:

HONEY ICE CREAM NO. 1
1 quart this cream
1 cup delicately flavored honey
Mix ingredients and freeze.

HONEY ICE CREAM NO. 2
1 pint milk
Yolks of 6 eggs
1 cup honey
1 pint cream

Heat the milk in a double boiler. Beat together the honey and eggs, add the hot milk, return the mixture to the double boiler, and cook it until it thickens. Add the cream and when the mixture is cool, freeze it.
