SUMMARY OF THE BASKET-

BALL SEASON 1932-1933

During the 1932-33 basketball

season Andover High had one of its

most successful seasons. Winning

eight games, losing seven and being

tied in one, the Andover team made

one of the best records made by an

Andover team in years.

During the season the Andover

team outscored their opponents by

one point. The Andover bunch ran

up a total of 427 points in their

16 games while their opponents

scored 426 points.

The Andover scorers were again

led by Brundage who scored 120

points, but he was closely followed

by Cannon with 109 points.

The longest losing streak suffered

by Andover was three games when

they lost to Canisteo, Albany and

Friendship, but they beat Alfred,

Almond and Friendship for the long-

est winning streak.
