Atlanta, Ga.—Georgia offered bargain prices in motor vehicles licenses this year, and sold out!

The legislature adjourned without reducing registration fees, so the governor directed that license plates be put on sale March 20 at a flat rate of \$3 for passenger cars, trucks and busses. The motor vehicle commissioner demanded a court order to that effect, but was removed from office and from the state payroll. Resort to injunction failed, for motorists hastened to do their shopping before it could become effective. They stormed the capitol, brushed aside the police, and registered by the thousands.

It is estimated that passenger car owners saved \$9 to \$24 and truck and bus operators as much as \$1,200.
