High prices are no proof of a good variety of strawberry or raspberry. The proved varieties that give satisfaction are always available at moderate prices. Insist that plants are free of disease.
Of the red raspberries, June is the first to ripen, has a bright red berry and fair quality. Cuthbert ripens later, has a medium-sized berry and excellent quality. However, Cuthbert is more susceptible to the mosaic disease than some other varieties. Latham, the favorite commercial variety, follows Cuthbert in ripening but does not equal Cuthbert in quality. Latham is least affected by disease. Newburg and Viking are two new kinds.
Plum Farmer is accepted as the best black raspberry for most conditions. It has large, high quality berries that ripen after Kansas and Black Pearl. Plum Farmer leads in both home and commercial plantings. Cumberland yields less than Plum Farmer but is not so susceptible to disease; the fruit is large, sweet, and of good quality. The Columbia leads the purple-canned sort and is an excellent berry for canning.
Eldorado leads the blackberries except in the extremely cold sections where Snyder is best. Use the Snyder only where Eldorado winter-kills. Cherry, Fay, Perfection and Wilder are red currant varieties, in order of ripening; Wilder is the favorite. Poorman, a red gooseberry and Chautauqua, a green variety, lead the gooseberry varieties, although many like the Fredonia, a red variety.
