Alfred, N. Y.—Continuing its schedule of programs Alfred University Men's Glee Club will sing at the following places on April 28th: Canastota, 9 o'clock; Nunda, 10:30; Castile, 1:00; Perry 8:00. On April 29th at Little Valley 10:00; Ellenville 1:00; Franklinville 8:00. On May 1st the group is scheduled at: Wayland 10:30; Cohocton 1:00; Avoca 3:00; and on May 4th: Shingletown, Pa., 9:00; Bradford, Pa., 1:30; Limestone, Pa., 3:00.

Accompanying the club will be Prof. I. A. Conroe as reader; Prof. Ray W. Wingate, director of music; and Dr. J. Wesley Miller, manager. The programs will include selections by a trombone quartet, and a pianist.

Plans for the summer session at Alfred University, July 3 to August 11 reveal the fact that courses may apply toward a degree, toward advance standing or deficiencies, or for a student's own personal gain.

The schedule offers jewelry, metal work, weaving, pottery and design besides the regular liberal arts courses. Classes are so arranged that students and professors alike may take advantage of the "outing possibilities"—hikes, picnics, etc., so plentiful around Alfred.

Another special feature of the summer session of 1933 is found in the fact that Ladies' Hall, "The Brick," will be completely ready for occupancy where woman students may find rooms instead of in Bartlett dormitory as was announced in the Summer Session Bulletin.

Prospects for an increase in freshman registration at Alfred University are bright with 17 students already registered.

Applications from 25 others are on file while 14 are waiting for graduation from high school to file their transcripts. These statistics show considerable advance over records from previous years. About 500 interested high school pupils have requested and received copies of the 1932-33 college catalog.
