e Fourth Place in Meet But Cer tain Men Show Up Good.

In the track meet held at Wells ville last Saturday, April 29th, And-over took only a fourth place in the meet, finishing behind Wellsville,

Altho the Andover team did not get many points they showed some individual stars in Jim Cannon, Malc Brundage, and Don Lynch. Cannon with a jump of five feet seven and one-half inches took first in the high jump. This was surprising because he has not tried to jump that high this year but it seemed that the higher the bar was raised the better Cannon got. Howard McAndrew also went five feet four inches in the high jump which was surprising but showed up well for McAndrew in future years.
