ANDOVER MEN TAKE PART IN TRACK MEET AT WELLSVILLE

Take Fourth Place in Meet But Certain Men Show Up Good.

In the track meet held at Wellsville last Saturday, April 29th, Andover took only a fourth place in the meet, finishing behind Wellsville, Canisteo and Bolivar who finished in the order named.

Altho the Andover team did not get many points they showed some individual stars in Jim Cannon, Male Brundage, and Don Lynch. Cannon with a jump of five feet seven and one-half inches took first in the high jump. This was surprising because he has not tried to jump that high this year but it seemed that the higher the bar was raised the better Cannon got. Howard McAndrew also went five feet four inches in the high jump which was surprising but showed up well for McAndrew in future years.

In the broad jump Male Brundage jumping for the first time this year took first in the broad jump with a leap of 17 feet 9 1/4 inches, which is very good considering that Brundage has had no practice this year.

Don Lynch showed good form in taking the half mile. Taking the lead from the start, Lynch never relinquished in but once just as the last lap began but he soon passed the men in front of him and won with a good lead over the nearest men.

Brundage also took a tie for second place in the pole-vault which was another upset when one considers that Brundage has been going only eight feet in practice but he cleared the bar at ten feet in the meet.

Jim Cannon was not up to his form in the discus but he took a fourth with a throw of 85 feet. This while it was good enough for fourth was not up to Jim's standard, who is a consistent performer at 100 feet.

It is felt that all these men along with a few others, including Brewster, in the shot; Joe McAndrew in the half mile and John Cannon and Rob Scott in some of the other field events, can become better and perhaps win some meets this year.
