ANDOVER ALUMNUS WINS HIGH JUMP AT BUFFALO

Robert Common, a graduate of Andover High School won the high jump in the annual moving-up day track meet sponsored by the University of Buffalo.

Robert or "Doc" as he is familiarly known in Andover, was pushed in the high jump but won it with a jump of six feet one inch. All other contestants but one were eliminated at five feet nine inches, but one fellow named Gibson.

Both "Doc" and Gibson made it until they came to six feet. Here "Doc" missed it twice but when it came to his third attempt he cleared the bar. The bar was then put up to six feet one inch and "Doc" made it on his first attempt but his rival missed it three times. This is the highest that Robert has ever gone and everyone in Andover is glad that he won the high jump.

ANDOVER TAKES EIGHTH IN INTER-SCHOLASTIC MEET

In the Inter-scholastic Meet held at Alfred on May 5th, Andover High School took eighth place with nine points. All of the points were made by Jim Cannon who took first in the high jump and fourth in the javelin and discus. In the pole vault Male Brundage had an off day when he was eliminated at nine feet which is below Brundage's standard. Don Lynch ran a good race in the half mile to take sixth place. He got off to a poor start but pulled up rapidly but he could not take a place which counted. "Dec" Clarke had bad luck in the 100 yard dash and the 440, being eliminated in the preliminary. Cannon's total was one short of the number which took first place and the individual scoring cup.

HOW, WHAT and WHY?

The Andover News has arranged with the Office of Information of the New York State colleges of agriculture and home economics to answer questions about problems of farm and home. If you enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope and mention the name of this paper, you will receive a direct reply to your query from the colleges.

A Shaded Lawn

D. T. S. asks: "The front section of my lawn is shaded by two maples. I had the entire section dug up last year, applied loam soil, and sowed seed but the seed failed to grow. The lawn on the other side of the house is on a slope and the grass does not grow; it does have a good crop of moss and dandelions. What would you advise?"

J. A. DeFrance of the department of ornamental horticulture says: "The maples are shallow-rooted but heavy feeders and rob the grass of both food and moisture. Since you applied top soil last fall, you might mix a cubic yard of well rotted manure with each 1,000 square feet of top soil in the upper six inches. Then rake at least 30 pounds of a 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer into each 1,000 square feet of top soil. Sow a mixture of one pound of red top and five pounds of red fescue to 1,000 square feet, if the soil is sandy. If the soil is of a heavy clay or loam, sow a mixture of five pounds of roughstalk meadow grass and one pound of redtop to 1,000 square feet. Both of the mixtures are excellent for shady places."

"The presence of moss on the sloping lawn indicates low fertility. If the soil contains enough plant food and the proper seed is used, the grass should thrive at the expense of the weeds."

"We are sending you a pamphlet, 'Lawn Making,' which is free on request to the college, which suggests other seed mixtures."</
