Albert Everman of Danville has a herd of Holsteins that he is proud of and other breeders envy. For the fourth consecutive month this herd has placed first in production of butterfat and milk in the Genesee Valley Dairy Herd Improvement Association.

The average for March for this herd was 1,309 pounds of milk and 42.3 pounds of fat. There are 18 cows in the herd and 12 of them produced 40 pounds of butterfat or over in March. K. W. Kane, tester for the association, in his monthly report to J. G. Culbertson of Danville, president, and to the Farm Bureau office states that it seems the longer this herd milks the better it produces.

Mr. Everman also owns a large farm near Andover.
