ANDOVER WINS DUAL TRACK MEET FROM ALFRED

Andover Men Stand Out in Field Events. Scholes of Alfred High Scorer With 22 Points.

Andover won a dual track meet from Alfred, held on the University Field at Alfred, Tuesday May 16, by a score of 61-43.

Alfred led Andover until it came to the last three events, the discus, broad jump and relay. Before these events were run off Alfred had a three point lead but by gaining 20 out of a possible 23 points Andover was able to win the meet.

Alfred took all three places in the mile while Andover took all three places in the broad jump. Scholes of Alfred was high point scorer with 22 points. J. Cannon led the Andover scorers with 21 points and Malcolm Brundage with 14 points was third.

The half mile was the most exciting race with Lynch of Andover fighting it out with Smith of Alfred. They were close together for the first two laps but on the last half lap Lynch pulled away rapidly to win by a good margin.

In the 440 Clarke won by a good margin, altho he only coasted the last quarter lap. Cannon was pushed somewhat in the high jump but finally won it at 5 feet 5 inches.

Scholes of Alfred was the winner in the 220 and 100 yard dashes but he was pushed in both events by Brundage and by Clarke in the 100.

In the relay Andover took an early lead and held it thruout to win in the good time of one minute 25 seconds on a soggy track.
