STATE OF NEW YORK DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Albany, April 24, 1933. To the Board of Elections of the County of Allegany;

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, pursuant to Section 69 of the Election Law, that, at a Special Election to be held in this State on Tuesday, May twenty-third, nineteen hundred thirty-three, the following officers may be lawfully voted for, to wit: One hundred and fifty delegates to a State Convention to consider and act upon the ratification of the following amendment to the Constitution of the United States proposed by the Congress of the United States to the several states:

ARTICLE Section 1. The eighteenth article or amendment of the constitution of the United States is hereby repealed. 2. The transportation or importation into any state, territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by conventions in the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by the Congress.

Given under my hand and Seal of office of the Department of State, at the City of Albany, this twenty-fourth day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and thirty-three.

Alfred University

Alfred, N. Y.—Social activities are being held by the various societies and fraternities of Alfred University during the past few days. Kappa Nu fraternity and Theta Chi sorority both held their annual spring formal Saturday night in their organization homes.

This Saturday night, Kappa Nu and Kappa Psi fraternities will stage their spring parties. Both will be formal dinner dances. The Klammen will have dinner at the Hotel St. James in Cuba, later adjourning to Cuba Lake dancing pavilion for dancing to the music of Kay Fitch and his new band. Spikemen of Alfred University opposed Colgate and Cortland Normal School teams here at Merrill Field during the past week and came out with one victory and a defeat to their credit. Cortland was taken over by an 85 to 41 score, while the tables were just reversed by Colgate, 81 to 46.

In the Colgate meet two records were broken, despite the slow and cold drizzle of rain that fell throughout the afternoon. George Vermtz of Colgate and Penn Relays javelin victor tossed the stick better than 198 feet to break the former record of 192 feet set two years ago. Charlie Clark of the Saxons vaulted 12 feet to break the 11 foot, 9 inch record he established himself last year.

The Cortland meet was looked upon as somewhat of a "warm-up" competition in preparation for the New York State Little Ten Conference Meet, which will be held in Rochester University this Saturday. However, when both teams met and started to do battle it was a different story. Especially was this true in the field events. Clark was forced to tie the record that he had set in the Colgate meet while he had first place in the broad jump. He had to make the best leap of his career, 21 feet 4 inches, to garner first.
